History of Tall Ship Maybe

Maybe is a traditional Dutch sailing ketch, built in 1929. She was designed by her original owner, Jan Jacob Van Rietschoten, and built by the well respected boat yard, De Vries Lentsch, in Amsterdam.

In 1956 Maybe took part in the first ever Tall Ships Race, and she is one of the remaining boats still taking part in the races today. In 1962 Maybe was bought by the Swiss family of Hans Fehr. During the 60s, 70s and 80s she regularly crossed the Atlantic between the West Indies and the Mediterranean. She also sailed through the Panama Canal and along the East Coast of the USA and Canada.

Maybe was sold to her current owners in 1989 and following a complete restoration she returned to sailing in 2007.
